Food And Nutrition

As I put some salt on the cold turkey I was eating the other day, I realized two important things. One was how important salt is as a seasoning to bring out the full flavor of food. The second thought I had was how valuable table salt is as a medium for Iodine, an essential mineral.

Do you use Iodized salt in your home? I ask this because there is reason to believe that many people believe that all table salt has added Iodine. This is not so. You might check in the kitchen to see if the salt box on the shelf has the word "Iodized" on the label.

Just for fun, I checked at a large supermarket that influences the eating practices of a great many families in the neighborhood. Sure enough, on the shelves the packages of salt were there, two without added Iodine for every package with Iodine added. This means the chances are only one in three that a person who shops at that supermarket and isn't particular about this would pick up a package of Iodized salt.

You will become aware of the importance of using Iodized salt during the next few months because throughout the country there is evidence that people are growing careless; public health nutritionists are encouraged to help to inform the general public of the necessity of using Iodized salt. When this renewed emphasis? It is because physicians are finding in people enlarged thyroid glands, called simple goiters, that are evidence of Iodine Deficiency Disease. I wonder if people realize what a simple goiter is. Iodine serves one purpose: it is an essential constituent of the thyroid hormone.

For the hormone to be produced by the thyroid gland, there must be Iodine present. If the food a person eats does not provide enough Iodine, the gland enlarges in an attempt to make up for the lack of Iodine. The enlarged thyroid is called simple goiter.

For forty years salt has been Iodized upon the recommendation of the Food and Nutrition Board of the National Research Council. This is why one seldom sees a person with a goiter, and there are very few women with scars on their necks that were so frequently seen when I was a child. Iodized salt has been very effective in eliminating Iodine Deficiency Disease. It is pitiful for it to be seen today in the 1960's, partly because people have become careless about purchasing Iodized salt for their families.

Imagine then the misgivings involved when tuning in an NBC special called "Rudolph the Red-Nosed Reindeer" during Sunday's children's hour.

It was a program of sheer delight — for young and old. The writers imaginatively enlarged on the well-known lyrics of the over-used holiday song. Actors were enchanting puppets.

Burl Ives, the voice of a puppet snowman who looked exactly like Burl Ives, told the tall tale, underlining its gentle moral, with exactly the right inflections.

The title song was sung only once — at the end, and in a way to be appreciated. NBC should add this one to its growing list of programs to repeat each year.

ABC says that Bing Crosby — who started the whole "White Christmas" thing in 1942 — will sing his famous number in the Dec. 21 episode of his current comedy series. If it comes off as well as "Rudolph," maybe rationing won't be necessary.

Recommended tonight: "The Alfred Hitchcock Hour," NBC, 10-11 EST — "Misadventure," one of those murderous triangles the series does well, with Lola Albright and Barry Nelson.
